Among the lighter occupations was the preparation of a book, *Aurora Australis*, set up and printed in the hut, with lithograph and process illustrations, also produced on the premises, printed on a hand-press and bound in venesta boards from the packing cases. A hundred copies were printed, but none for sale, and the work is already a rarity for bibliophiles, both on account of the beauty of its typography and because no other printed book has ever been produced on the poleward side of latitude 70°.
